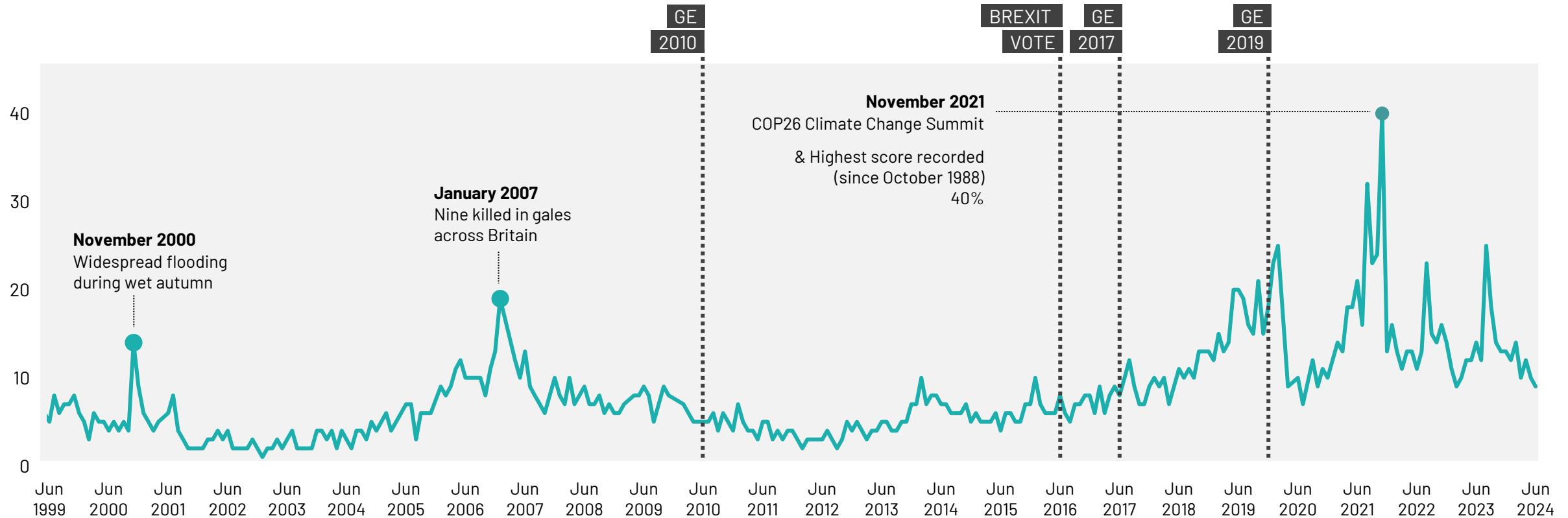

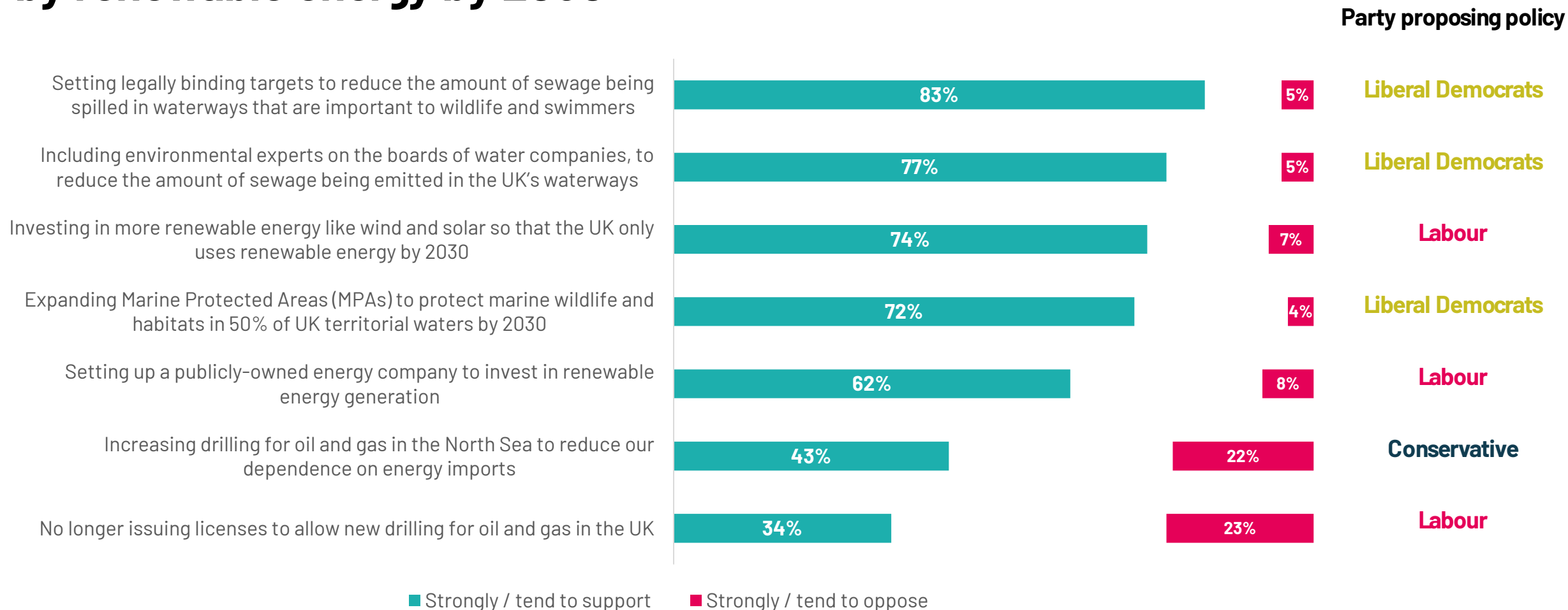
What do you see as the most/other important issues facing Britain today?

Q: To what extent would you support or oppose the following policies about energy and the environment?

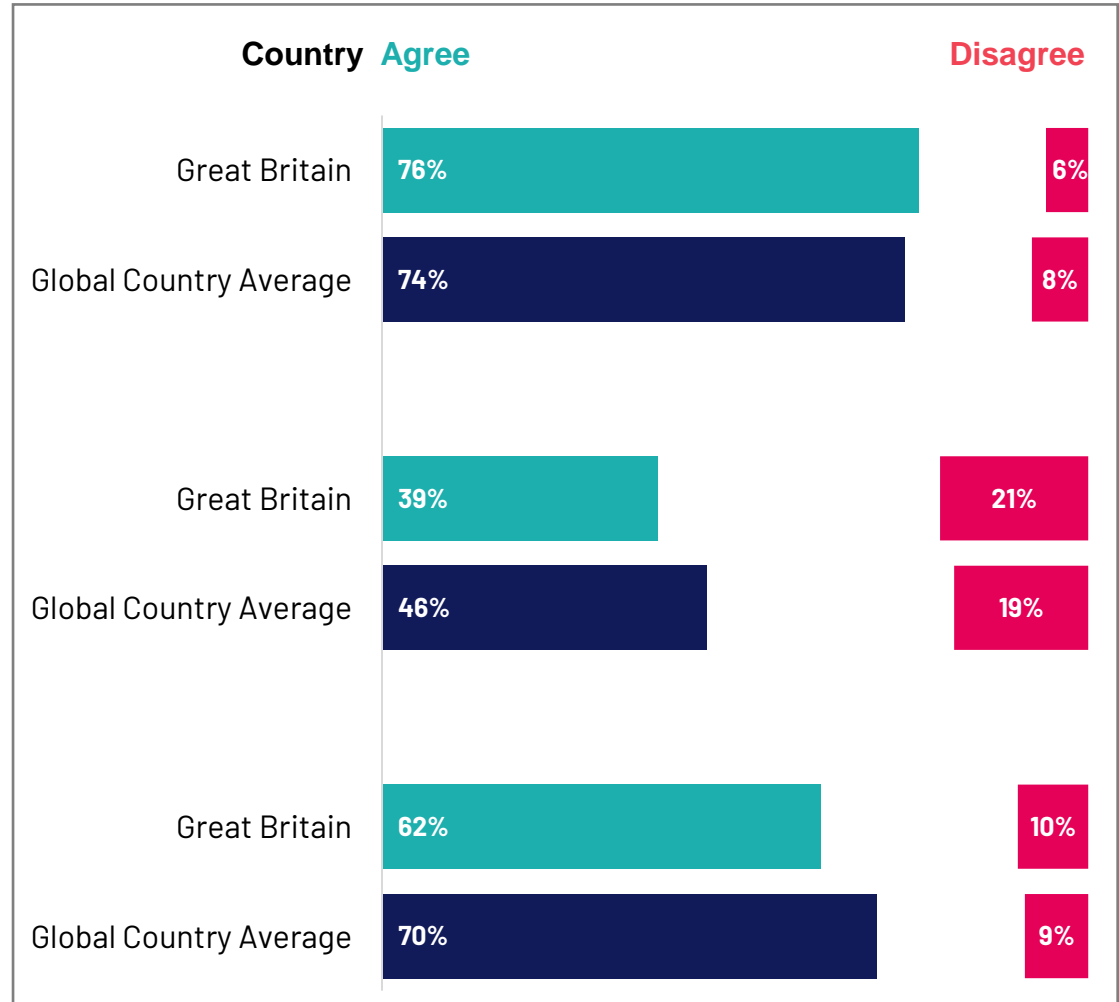
